

# LIST OF CRIMES THAT MUST BE REPORTED

Campus Safety encourages the reporting of all actual or suspected violations of federal and state law, city ordinances, and NHTI rules, regulations, and policy.

The following is a list of crimes that are required to be reported to federal, state, or local authorities. Per the Clery Act, they are also to be reported to the Department of Education. Individuals designated as campus safety authorities (CSAs) are required to report the following:

## Criminal Offenses

- Criminal Homicide
  - Murder
  - Non-negligent manslaughter
- Manslaughter by negligence
- Sexual assault
  - Rape
  - Fondling
  - Incest
  - Statutory rape
- Robbery
- Aggravated assault
- Burglary
- Motor vehicle theft
- Arson

## Hate Crimes

- Includes all criminal offenses listed above, and Violence Against Woman Act (VAWA) crimes.
- Larceny/theft
- Simple assaults
- Intimidation
- Destruction/damage/vandalism of property

## Violence Against Woman Act (VAWA) Offenses

- Dating violence
- Domestic violence
- Stalking

## Arrests or Referrals for Disciplinary Action

- Weapon law violations
- Drug abuse violations
- Liquor law violations

All CCSNH/college employees with supervisory or management responsibilities, and individuals designated as Campus Security Authorities under the Clery Act who receive information about possible sexual misconduct/harassment of employees are required to make a report to either the NHTI Title IX Coordinator or Campus Safety:

- Dating violence
- Domestic violence
- Stalking
- Other sexual misconduct (i.e. exploitation)
- Sexual harassment
- Gender-based discrimination
  - Sex
  - Sexual Orientation
  - Gender Identity

Per New Hampshire state law, there is a duty by anyone to report the following to state authorities either by contacting local law enforcement or the Department of Health and Human Services. Contact the Campus Safety Department to investigate, document and coordinate with these authorities.

## Child Abuse and Neglect

Per New Hampshire state law, any person “having reason to suspect that a child has been abused or neglected shall report” the neglect or abuse. A child is defined as any person who has not reached their eighteenth birthday. Reference [New Hampshire State Law RSA 169-C:29](#) for more information.

## Protective Services to Adults

Per New Hampshire state law, “Any person, including, but not limited to, physicians, other health care professionals, social workers, clergy, and law enforcement officials, suspecting or believing in good faith that any adult who is or who is suspected to be vulnerable has been subjected to abuse, neglect, self-neglect, or exploitation or is living in hazardous conditions shall report or cause a report to be made.” Reference [New Hampshire State Law RSA 161-F:46](#) for more information.

Vulnerable “means that the physical, mental, or emotional ability of a person is such that he or she is unable to manage personal, home, or financial affairs in his or her own best interest, or he or she is unable to act or unable to delegate responsibility to a responsible caretaker or caregiver.”

## Student Hazing

Per New Hampshire state law ([Reference NH State Law RSA 631:7](#)) students at an education institution who engage in an organization; “...meaning a fraternity, sorority, association, corporation, order, society, corps, athletic group, cooperative, club, or service, social or similar group, whose members are or include students, operating at or in conjunction with an educational institution” engages in the following:

“Any act directed toward a student, or any coercion or intimidation of a student to act or to participate in or submit to any act, when:

- (1) Such act is likely or would be perceived by a reasonable person as likely to cause physical or psychological injury to any person; and
- (2) Such act is a condition of initiation into, admission into, continued membership in or association with any organization.”
